Eucharistic Adoration

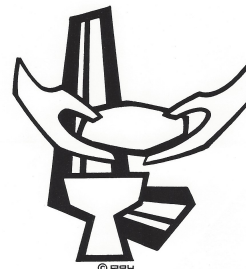

HAPPY Father's DAY

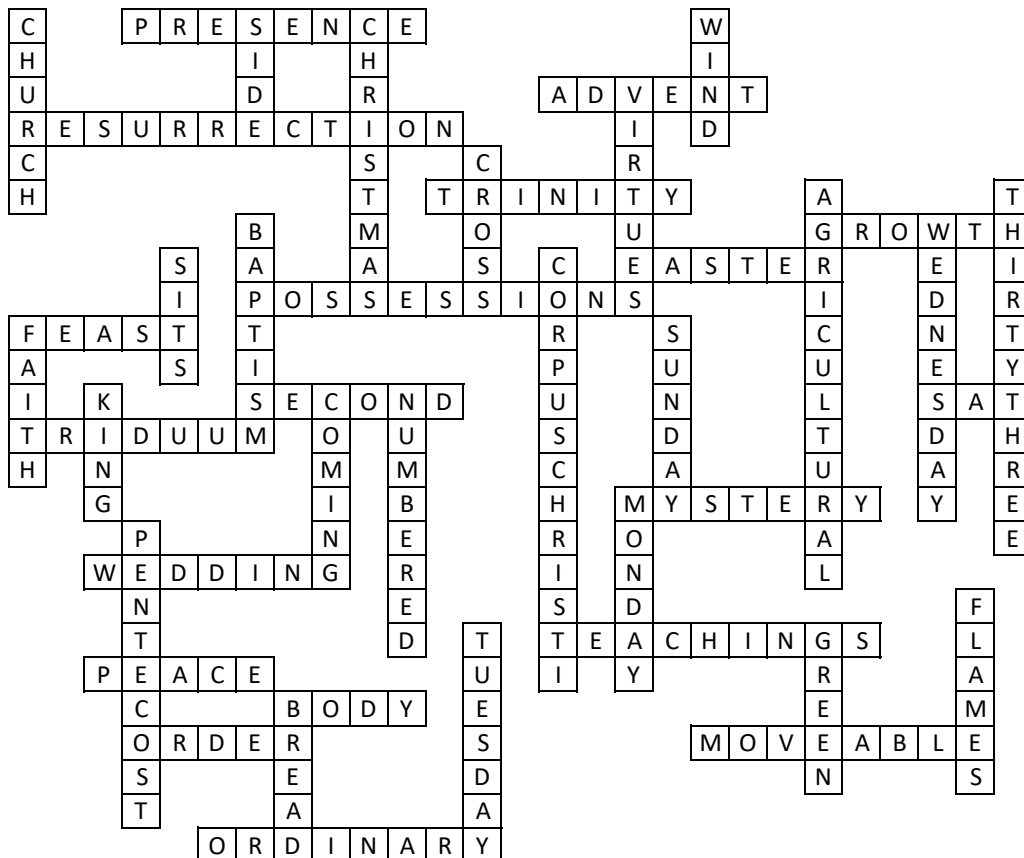

Thank you for your generous support! To date we have collected \$38,078.25 for *Together in Action*. This is about 70% of our 2021 goal. Excess funds collected for TIA from our parish will be shared between the Interfaith Food Bank and The Holy Spirit Schools lunch program. Other special collections: \$1,855 for the *India Covid Relief* fund and \$12,663 for the *Seminary Fund*.

The First Nations, Métis and Inuit national organizations and the Bishops of Canada have been preparing, for over two years now, a delegation of Indigenous people to meet with the Holy Father to foster meaningful encounters of dialogue and healing. The event will provide Pope Francis with a unique opportunity to hear directly from Indigenous Peoples, express his heartfelt closeness, address the impact of colonization and the implication of the Church in the residential schools, so as to respond to the suffering of Indigenous Peoples and the ongoing effects of intergenerational trauma.

The global pandemic caused by COVID-19 has stalled this project; however, the Bishops remain committed to moving forward with the delegation prior to the end of 2021

Fr. Kevin's Cluttered Desk

So, which is easier, seeing the faults in someone else or seeing your own faults? One of the things that has always worked for me in levelling the playing field is the Confiteor at the Mass. Confessing that we are sinners in need of God's great mercy and doing it in a very public way, this has always helped me to do that "stop, think." In the Seminary we were taught the old teaching of "see, judge, act." Judge in that sense is evaluate and then act, but it assumes always for the good. Sadly, our human natures seem to move towards the negative and not the good of self or other.

The other element at play is the question of "see." What am I seeing? What do I understand of what I am seeing? And how is what I am seeing affecting me? Have you ever noticed that certain things, as soon as we see them, upset us? For instance, when people walk by the tabernacle without a bow or genuflection, my brain asks the question "are they aware?" When people used to walk into church and not bless themselves with Holy Water, my brain would ask, "have we not taught them?" When people talk about other people, my brain would ask "do they not know that gossip is a serious sin?" Seeing needs to be paired with understanding, you need to know what is going on in the other person before you can move to any form of judgement.

I believe one of our greatest faults is we don't understand the other person and what is going on in them. When we take the time to get to know the other person and to understand each other's struggles, temptations and hurts we begin a journey of understanding their choices and actions. I may not agree with their choices but understanding where the choice is coming from can help both of us move forward and help each other. A lot of the "seeing" factor leads us to understanding culpability: The responsibility for wrongdoing or failure: the quality or state of being culpable moral/legal/criminal culpability.

For me this leads me to reflect on my culpability and on the question, am I leading others to sin or from sin? How are my words, deeds/actions affecting others? Is there something about me that I need to understand better? A simple personal example is "chips", I don't keep chips in the rectory for a very simple reason, I will eat the entire bag. Chips are a weakness for me, and I never really thought about it till society started harping on eating less salt. I had never thought about how much salt is in a bag of chips and what salt does to me. Another simple example is coffee. How many of us know someone that you should not talk to until they have had their second or third cup of coffee in the morning?

Love of neighbour demands knowing your neighbour, "seeing" them and yourself through different lenses. Some days we just need to "stop and think".
