Eucharistic Adoration



Every Tuesday we will have Eucharistic Adoration at Assumption from 8:00 to 11:00 p.m. with confessions from 8:00 - 10:00.

Adoration will be live-streamed from 8-9pm for those who cannot get to the church and want to spend some time with Jesus.

Please note the 14 hour livestream adoration to pray for our seminarians and vocations.

All Saints & the Covid Restrictions

- 1. Adoration has moved to outdoor Adoration and will continue for the summer.
- 2. Eucharist will be offer to those at Adoration at 8:30 and 9:30. We will come out and those people whose car lights are on will be invited into the church in groups of 15 (names will be taken) for a short "Rite of Reception of the Eucharist outside of Mass". The Rite is about 5 minutes long, you may sit or stand for the service. If there is more than 15 people we will celebrate the Rite as many times as needed. On May 11th we had five celebrations. You must stay in your cars until we call you in, we do not want to be questioned about what might appear to be an outdoor gathering during Adoration. Please remember to hand sanitize when you come in and when you leave.
- 3. Confession will still be offered from 8 until 10 pm on Tuesday in the parish hall entrance (like last summer).
- 4. Reception of the Eucharist on Sundays (outside of Mass) from 10 to 11 at Assumption Church. Please line up and we will take your names under the overhang by the office. Please remember to practice social distancing. People will come into the church in groups of 15, to celebrate the "Rite of Reception of the Eucharist outside of Mass". After celebrating the Rite the people will leave through the main doors of the church. If there is a long lineup when you arrive, just wait patiently in your car until the people have entered the church and the line is shorter. Please remember to leave immediately so others have a place to park.
- 5. Livestream of Saturday evening and Sunday morning masses will continue.

Will you watch with your seminarians for one hour?



Pentecost Sunday is one of the most **ancient** feasts of the **Church**, celebrated **early** enough to be **mentioned** in the Acts of the Apostles (20:16) and **Saint** Paul's First Letter to the **Corinthians** (16:8). Pentecost is **celebrated** on the 50th day after Easter (if we count both **Easter** Sunday and Pentecost Sunday), and it **supplants** the Jewish **feast** of Pentecost, which took **place** 50 days after the **Passover** and celebrated the **sealing** of the **Old** Covenant on **Mount** Sinai.

(Acts 2:5). Jews "from every nation under heaven" were gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the Jewish feast of Pentecost. On that Sunday, ten days after the Ascension of Our Lord, the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin Mary were gathered in the Upper Room, where they had seen Christ after His Resurrection: And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Christ had **promised** His **Apostles** that He would **send** His **Holy** Spirit, and, on **Pentecost**, they were **granted** the **gifts** of the Holy Spirit. The Apostles began to preach the **Gospel** in all of the languages that the Jews who were **gathered** there spoke, and **about** 3,000 people were **converted** and **baptized** that day.

That is **why** Pentecost is often **called** "the **birthday** of the Church." On Pentecost Sunday, with the **descent** of the Holy Spirit, Christ's **mission** is **completed**, and the New **Covenant** is **inaugurated**. It's **interesting** to note that Saint Peter, the first **Pope**, was already the **leader** and **spokesman** for the Apostles on Pentecost Sunday.

During those 50 days, both fasting and kneeling were strictly forbidden, because this period was supposed to give us a foretaste of the life of Heaven. In more recent times, parishes celebrated the approach of Pentecost with the public recitation of the Novena to the Holy Ghost. While most parishes no longer publicly recite this Novena, many individual Catholics do. Attention Comin' Alive Campers!! Fr. Kevin's Cluttered Desk

A blessed Pentecost to all of you. St. Paul tells us that there are a variety of gifts of the Holy Spirit but there are also a variety of fruits of the Holy Spirit. The 12 Fruits of the Holy Spirit are charity (or perfect love), joy, peace, patience, benignity (or kindness), goodness, longanimity (or long-suffering), mildness (or gentleness), faith, modesty, continency (or self-control), and chastity. We tend, as a people, to focus on the gifts of the Spirit and I know for myself in teaching Confirmation that has been a tendency. But the living out of the gifts is found in the fruits and how the fruits of the Spirit are shared with others.

Looking at just "joy" are we really a people of joy? In the midst of this pandemic where are we finding our joy or are we allowing the challenges of life to dampen our joy or reduce it to next to nothing? To live in the joy of the Lord, requires us to seek out joy, and to be joy for others. Do I take joy in the fact that I may not be able to go to church but in this day and age we can livestream? Do I take joy in the discovery of lots of good Catholic education available on the internet? Do I rejoice that we have EWTN and Salt and Light Catholic television? Do I rejoice in the Holy Father's desire to keep His people safe? Do I rejoice in being able to join my present struggles and sufferings to Christ, for my sufferings are nothing compared to His suffering for me? Longanimity, another of the fruits of the Holy Spirit, is something we all are called to as Catholics. But it is a suffering that embraces joy, joy in the Lord, joy in the Lord's suffering and the understanding of the gift of suffering. Picking up our cross and following Christ is a theme and a way of life for all of us as Catholics, as Christians. Sadly, as first world people we have lost our understanding of suffering and our understanding of joy. For many, suffering is the struggle of this world and in this world, but our joy comes from the Lord and is always found in the Lord.

Maybe if you get a chance this week, take another look at the fruits and ask yourself how many of them are lived expressions in your life? How many do you exhibit to family and friends? How many are seen in you?
